NEW RULES - TAKE NOTE!

The British Government have changed the rules relating to the interest-free loan and the payment of fees. In future, only those students who do NOT have a bachelor's degree when they begin their studies in Britain, will be entitled to the interest-free loan (and most bursaries). This means that the best time for you to study in Britain is at the end of your second year at college or university. Of course you may still apply if you are a 3rd, 4th or 5th year student, but the Government will not then help you with a loan.
